1. It is the sincere wish of the Solanco Fair Association to maintain livestock areas in a clean, neat and safe condition for the enjoyment of Fair patrons, therefore a good housekeeping award has been initiated and will be awarded to the exhibitors best displaying these qualities.
2. The award will be based on the following point system:

Cleanliness of animal	20 points
Cleanliness of bedding	20 points
Keeping feed and supplies presentable	10 points
Keeping equipment clean and neat	10 points
Keeping aisles clean	20 points
Courtesy to fair patrons	<u>20 points</u>

RULES

1. All exhibitors of swine must reside in the Solanco or Penn Manor School Districts.
2. Exhibitors must have passed their 8th birthday but not have passed their 19th birthday by January 1 of the year of the fair. In the event the individual does not complete high school, he or she may not exhibit past their 18th birthday.
3. All entries will be entered free of charge. All entries must be reported to the chairman on or before September 1, 2017. The chairman may refuse late entries.
4. All exhibitors must be present when animals are to be shown unless approved by chairman.
5. All exhibits must be entered from 5 – 9 PM, Tuesday evening, and should not be removed until 10 PM Friday.
6. All swine must have **STATE** health papers. No evidence of any communicable disease or unthriftiness.
7. A **copy** of health papers for the chairman to keep is mandatory. No exceptions. Papers will not be returned.
8. All exhibitors must have a completed and signed “Animal Owner or Caretakers Verification of Veterinarian – Client – Patient relationship” form that will be collected at check-in.
9. Each exhibitor must furnish his own feed and feed trough and also see that his animals are fed and properly cared for during the fair. No straw should be used for bedding. Sawdust will be provided.
10. Animals must be raised and owned by the exhibitor at least 70 days before the fair.
11. No exhibitor may enter more than 2 hogs.
12. **Any hog under 220 or over 280 lbs. may not be shown.**
13. Each exhibitor must present an exhibitor number Tuesday night to be eligible to show.
14. **Body clipping will not be permitted. Ear and tail clipping are still acceptable.**

RULES

1. Competition is limited to crop growers of the community.
2. All crop entries must have been grown by the exhibitor since last year's fair.
3. Exhibitors may enter in as many classes or subdivisions of classes as they wish but no exhibitor shall make more than one entry in a single class.
4. The judge may withhold any premium for lack of merit or may award second or third premium only if deemed best. No premiums will be awarded in any class unless the exhibits are worthy.

DIVISION A – GRAIN AND SEED CROPS

Section 1 – Corn

1. Each entry shall consist of one, ten or thirty ears, as the class requires. Entries not having the required number of ears will be disqualified.
2. The Daryl Supplee Family will donate \$20 to the 10 ear class winner.
3. PIONEER LOCAL DEALER – Solanco Seeds will donate \$20 for first, \$10 for second in the 30 ear class.
4. Suggestions for selecting an exhibit:
 - A. Select 50 – 100 of the best ears and re-select 10 or 30 ears to the following points:
 1. Select ripe ears, judged by hardness, dryness, and weight of ear and brightness of color.
 2. Condition – ear should be firm, dry, and free from mold, rotten kernels, and insect damage.
 3. Uniform – in length, girth, number of rows, and indentation; cobs should be bright and of the same color.
 4. Ear should be well proportioned, rows and kernels straight and **well filled out at the butts and tips.**
